

## Last Day of Term 3





## Open Classrooms

Students have been working hard over the past few weeks during our Author Study unit, delving deep into an author and their texts. We would love for families to take this opportunity to view an Author Study reading lesson, seeing how the class discusses a text, unpacking the language and text features.

#### Scienceworks Excursion

Grade 6 students patiently waited to board the train to Scienceworks on the 6th of August. Upon arrival, students were given the opportunity to explore sections of Scienceworks including Thinking Ahead and Sports Works. The most popular activity was to race against Cathy Freeman, which allowed students to see how energy from our body can be transformed. We then made our way to the pumping station and had a small break before we entered the Lightning Show. Once we entered the dark warehouse, our guide provided us with information about static electricity, conductors and insulators, electric circuits and safety switches. He also demonstrated how energy can be transferred and transformed through various experiments. Highlights include a hair-raising encounter with a Van de Graaff generator, making light with a pickled onion and creating lightening using the biggest Jacob's Ladder display in the country. The show finished with a spectacular demonstration of lightning strikes and tips for safety strategies during lightning storms. We then had our lunch, explored a few more sections before we caught a train back to school. We would like to thank parent helpers for supporting us on the day.



At the end of the session, students tried to memorise the phonetic alphabet to spell their own name. Towards the end of the session police answered additional questions asked by students.



## Grade 6 Gala Day



#### Health Information

The Department of Human Services supplies to all schools *The Blue Book*, which details information on many community-based infections. At times we will highlight different community concerns and will send, via the newsletter the guidelines supplied to us from *The Blue Book and* the Department of Health (Victoria); please find information below on **Hand, foot and mouth disease.** 

What is Hand, foot and mouth? Hand, foot and mouth disease is caused by a virus which causes blisters on the hands and feet, in the mouth and often in the 'nappy' area. It generally is a mild disease that lasts seven to ten days.

# What are the symptoms of Hand, foot and mouth? The common symptoms are:

- A high temperature (fever)
- Sore throat
- Small, blister-like lesions that may occur on the inside of the mouth, sides of the tongue, palms of the hands, fingers, soles of the feet and the 'nappy' area.

**How long does is it infectious?** The skin blisters are infectious until they become crusty and there is no fluid in the blisters.

Children should be excluded from school, kindergarten and child care centres until all the blisters have dried up.

**Can Hand, foot and mouth be treated?** There is no specific treatment. Use paracetamol as directed for fever. If fever persists or there are worrying symptoms consult your local doctor immediately

#### Preventing the spread of Hand, foot and mouth disease:

- Good personal hygiene is essential.
- Washing hands carefully after contact with the blister
- Allowing blisters to dry naturally and never pierce blisters

## Applying for an undergraduate teaching degree in Victoria?

Year 12 students planning to apply for undergraduate teaching degrees via VTAC will need to be aware of the selection criteria for courses. This may include:

- Subject prerequisites and minimum study scores
- CASPer Test results
- Minimum ATAR

NB: If you are applying to Australian Catholic University (ACU), you can elect to complete the 'ACU Teacher Selector Statement' or the CASPer Test.

You can also elect to apply directly to ACU and complete the 'ACU Teacher Selector Statement' rather than apply through VTAC, https://bit.ly/2lmpH2a

#### Subject prerequisites

- Each course will have a minimum English study score and most will have a mathematics requirement.
- Prerequisites for courses can be found via the VTAC Course Search function https://bit.ly/2AmyoMw

#### CASPer Test

- You will need to register for and complete the CASPer Test by 17 November to be eligible for December Round offers, https://takecasper.com/
- The Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre (VTAC) has developed a fact sheet that can be accessed at this link https://bit.ly/2lVrqfd

#### Minimum ATAR requirement

- Applicants will need to achieve a minimum ATAR of 70. Some universities may have a higher ATAR requirement.
- With academic and/or equity bonus points, applicants may be able to access courses below this ATAR.

#### Literacy and Numeracy Requirements

 Students will need to register for and pass the Literacy and Numeracy Test for Initial Teacher Education Students during their teaching degree, https://bit.lig/2wzDXYg

Australia National University offers an exclusive double degree in Asia Pacific Studies and Global Liberal Arts in partnership with the Ritsumeikan University, Japan. Students commencing at Ritsumeikan will spend their third year of study at ANU, while students commencing at ANU will study at Ristumeikan in their second and third years. ## 3 humanitarian STEM jobs making a major impact

When we think of humanitarian and social impact careers, we often think of legal aid, education and social work-type gigs. Cassie Steel from Careers with STEM, has identified 3 science, tech and engineering jobs making a massive impact on others. These include:

#### Geographic Information Systems Analyst:

Experts in geographic information systems use their navigation, map-making and data processing skills to assist when disasters – like earthquakes, floods and human conflicts – strike. They create maps to assist in-situ field workers access hard-to-reach places, as well as process geographic data to predict, prevent and improve response time for future scenarios.

Agronomist: Agronomists traditionally study plants, animals, soil and cultivation techniques to improve the productivity and sustainability of farms and agricultural industries, yet act as key specialists on food security when extreme climates or conflict hit. The agricultural scientists re-asses the use of effected farmlands in struggling environments, and offer solutions on reducing famine and maintaining a steady crop supply.

Epidemiologist: these guys spend their time focussing on diseases – how they're caused and spread, but also how they can be contained and prevented – in vulnerable communities. Disaster relief teams rely on epidemiologists to investigate outbreaks (think: meningitis and cholera in an over-populated refugee camp), which often involves managing large-scale studies and mining massive data sets to support health campaigns and programs.


