Dear Parents/Guardians,

Social Media: College leadership and teachers have been asked to intervene recently following inappropriate, rude and insulting social media behaviours between students, and unknown parties; that is occurring outside of school hours. Where we can assist by speaking to a student about appropriate on-line behaviour we will. We will

also do what we can about providing support for affected students, but the availability of school resources is limited.

Social media, in almost all cases has a minimum age requirement of 13. Parents allowing their children in Year 7 and below to access social media, Facebook, Instagram etc. are enabling a significant risk to their child. There are recommendations about how children should be introduced to social media, e.g., parent supervised time, parent checking of posts etc., which should be followed to minimise risk.

If your child becomes the victim of cyberbullying, please report it to the school so we are able to see what assistance can be provided. The information below is to assist parents with actions they can take about cyberbullying as well as a sheet attached to this newsletter on Parenting Tips.

North East Corner of School Oval: I am a very reluctant, and highly disengaged user of social media, however, others reported there is a Facebook page that focusses on Manor Lakes College. Recently there was a discussion about the fencing that has been erected around the north east corner of the school oval. I was expecting this to happen, but I am surprised at the speed it has occurred.

I was approached some time ago by Department of Education Infrastructure staff. They were looking for a site to build a Western English Language School facility. The Western English Language School provides intensive English instruction for children who are new, non-English speaking arrivals to Australia. I have not been filled in on the demographics but assume there are increasing numbers of families residing in the Wyndham area who are recent arrivals.

The block of land the school is on has two titles, the area being enclosed by the steel fence and the school oval along Scholar Drive are on a title belonging to the Department of Education. The community oval and the Community Centre are on a title owned by the City of Wyndham. Our students use the school oval at recesses and lunchtimes, but the area enclosed by the temporary fence is too far from the main part of the school to be supervised as effectively as I wish. In my discussions with the Department of Education, I had no concerns about them using an area of their title to build the Western English Language School outpost because we have limited use for the area. The WELS outpost will be self-managing but will share an area of the Department of Education's land title.

School Oval: Linked to the article above, I received information from the Wyndham City Council that they were successful in accessing a Shared Facilities grant to upgrade the school oval. I have not been given the time frame, but funding has been approved for the council to regrade and resurface, repair and install a watering system, install lighting and install cricket nets. The oval will remain Department of Education property, and we will have full use during school hours. Organisations will apply to the City of Wyndham's recreation department to use the oval outside school hours, e.g. the Manor Lakes Football Club may book training times for junior teams to train after school.

The WELS outpost will take up a corner of the block, but will not impede the works taking place and providing a much better facility for school and community use.

Primary Playground: My, thanks to the Student Representative Council who worked with the primary classes to identify preferred playground pieces to be installed into a playground to be built north of Bonney. Work should commence in a few weeks, and be complete by the end of next term. More information will be provided in future newsletters.



Rationale

Consistent with the mission of Manor Lakes P-12 College, the homework program encourages students to take responsibility for their own learning. It encourages engagement with family and community, while recognising the many interests/activities that individuals and families pursue outside of school hours. Designed to be a positive experience for all involved, homework provides children with the opportunity to:

- develop a balanced lifestyle;
- develop regular study habits;
- take responsibility for their own learning;
- work independently in a self-motivated way;
- make links to wider community activities.

Guidelines

Manor Lakes P-12 College implements its Years Prep-6 Homework Policy in line with the DET Homework Guidelines and Expectations. Homework will include an array of different activities to support the learning taking place within the classroom. Manor Lakes P-12 College recognises that many of our students and families engage in after school activities, so homework set is designed primarily to encourage positive family interactions and to allow relaxed time for children to pursue their own learning.

Homework at Manor Lakes P-12 College takes into account the need for a flexible homework schedule that accommodates students' after school commitments, and fosters the development of the students' planning and time management skills. It encourages students to interact with family members, as well as finding time for themselves and their interests. This homework policy is designed to assist in making home tasks more meaningful for students and their families.

Homework at Manor Lakes P-12 College encourages communication between teachers, parents/carers and students about student learning. Homework activities complement the learning happening within the classroom and support the development of skills and knowledge in all students. Homework is designed to be challenging yet achievable, and considers the diverse range of students' individual learning styles and abilities.

Differentiation of Homework Tasks

The positive effects of homework should be the same for all children. Therefore, homework must be differentiated where possible, to suit individual needs. Teachers and parents/carers are to work together to ensure that all children understand homework tasks before attempting them.

Implementation

Homework will be provided to students on a regular and consistent basis and will be expected to be returned completed and signed by the due date.

The nature of homework tasks may change from term to term, reflecting the curriculum and different emphasis in the teaching program. However, homework activities will be designed to provide students with opportunities to practice skills, review content and deepen understanding of concepts learned.

Students are expected to continue their Home Reading program throughout all year levels of the College.

<u>Teachers can support students by:</u>

- setting homework regularly with clear expectations and due dates;
- differentiating homework tasks to suit individual needs;
- ensuring that all students understand homework tasks before attempting them;
- ensuring that parents are informed of homework tasks and relevant due dates;

providing prompt feedback to students, as per DET Homework Guidelines.

Students can take responsibility for their own learning by:

- clarifying any homework tasks they do not understand with their teacher;
- seeking assistance when required;
- writing homework in diary or take homework tasks home;
- organising their time to manage home obligations, participation in physical activity and sports, and recreational and cultural activities;
- sharing homework with parents/carers.

Families/Carers can support their child by:

While most students should not need the help of an adult when they complete homework, they do have a role to play. They should:

- develop a positive and productive approach to homework;
- create a home environment that facilitates the student's homework;
- encourage and offer help when such help is clearly required;
- offer moral support and be positive;
- report any difficulties to the teacher;
- allow ample time to play and engage in all activities assigned as homework (including the more informal tasks):
- spare some time to engage in those tasks that require parent/carer participation;
- reinforce the idea that learning the balance between work and play is a lifelong skill;
- sign the homework when it has been completed by the student (on the due date).

If a pattern of homework avoidance develops, the class teacher will work with the child and their parents to foster improved homework routines.

Can all parents and guardians please make sure that you are regularly logging onto Compass via the website https://manorlakesp12.vic.jdlf.com.au/. This is the College's school management program and will provide you access to all aspects of your child's school life.
