



APPLYING FOR UNDERGRADUATE TEACHING?

Applying for an undergraduate teaching degree in Victoria? Year 12 students planning to apply for undergraduate teaching degrees via VTAC will need to be aware of the selection criteria for courses. This will include:

- Subject prerequisites and minimum study scores
- CASPer Test results
- Minimum ATAR

NB: If you are **only** applying to Australian Catholic University, you can elect to complete the 'ACU Teacher Selector Statement' **instead** of the CASPer Test, http://bit.ly/2ewFzbT

Subject prerequisites

- Each course will have a minimum English study score and most will have a mathematics requirement.
- Prerequisites for courses can be found via the VTAC Course Search function https://bit.ly/2AmyoMw

CASPer Test

- You will need to register for and complete the CASPer Test by the 9th of December to be eligible for Round 1 offers, https://takecasper.com/
- The Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre (VTAC) has developed a fact sheet that can be accessed at this link - https://bit.ly/2ozrmzH

Minimum ATAR requirement

- Applicants will need to achieve a minimum ATAR of 70. Some universities may have a higher ATAR requirement.
- With academic and/or equity bonus points, applicants may be able to access courses below this ATAR.

Literacy and Numeracy Requirements

• Students will need to register for and pass the Literacy and Numeracy Test for Initial Teacher Education Students during their teaching degree, https://bit.ly/2wzDXYg

Key Dates for Applying to University in Australia

It doesn't matter which state you live in or where you complete your Year 12 studies, you can apply to any course at any university in Australia, if you meet the eligibility criteria specific to that course and university.

So, if you're planning on continuing your education after you leave Year 12, you're going to have to choose what course you would like to do and which universities you would most like to study at. If you haven't already decided on your preferences, then it's time to get your skates on and get organised.

And just to make life interesting, each state has different application processes. That's why we've done the research and put together a quick guide to the key dates you need to be aware of so you don't miss out.

Victoria

VTAC (Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre) are the centralised applications service for all publicly funded Victorian Universities. All the information you'll need to know about courses, universities, applying to a University in Victoria and more, can be found at: http://www.vtac.edu.au/

Applications

You can lodge your application to VTAC right now (applications opened on the 6th August 2018).

You should aim to complete your application to VTAC before the 27th September 2018. Bear in mind the earlier you get your application in, the earlier you'll be considered for an offer. The fee for lodging an application by that date will be \$36.00.

If for some reason you're falling behind with your application, according to the VTAC website, you can still lodge by the 2nd November 2018 (the late processing fee then jumps up to \$105). The absolute last date you can apply and still be considered for the first main round of offers is the 7thDecember 2018 (the processing fee then is \$137).

However, when we spoke to VTAC to confirm these dates, they advised us that the latest you should get your application in to ensure you make it into the main round of offers is by the 31st October 2018. We would strongly advise you take heed of the October cut-off date to avoid disappointment, alternatively contact VTAC directly yourself.

Other applications

Scholarship applications to VTAC close on 12th October 2018. SEAS applications to VTA close on 12th October 2018.

Preferences

You can choose up to EIGHT preferences to list on your application. Preferences are the courses you would like to apply for. Listing eight preferences maximises your chances of getting an offer.

When choosing your preferences, it's a good idea to list the ones you really want first, the ones that are more realistic next, and a couple of safe options. That way you'll ensure that you get at least one offer at the end of

each round.

ATAR Score Results

VCAA will post final Year 12 results and ATARs from 7am on the 14th December 2018.

Last date to change preferences

Once you've received your ATAR, you may have done better than you expected, you might not have done as well as anticipated, or you may just have had a change of heart about which course to study or the University you would like to go to.


If that's the case, you can still change you preferences after receiving your ATAR. You'll have to make sure that you change your preferences between 10am and 4pm on the 4th January 2019, after that you won't be able to alter your application before the first round of offers.

Offers

Once you've submitted your final preferences and the cut-off window has passed, you can expect to start receiving offer notifications from the 16th January 2019.
