This journey has been a very long personal and emotional one for me not only losing my loved ones but as I am a severe asthmatic and suffer with blood noses that are triggered when it's hot, as you can imagine growing my hair makes me feel hot most of the time. Not so long ago I was very happy to have been informed that my Godmother/Aunty had completed her treatments for breast Cancer and she is gaining her health and strength back and has been told she is Cancer Free. I am trying to fundraise \$1000 by Shaving my Beautiful Thick Long Curly Hair so I am asking for you all to come along to my 'Greatest Shave Day' where I will be having some Cake & Goodie Stalls, a Raffle or 2 as well as having an Auction where you can bid to cut one of my plaits off as well as witness me having all my hair shaved off for this very worthy cause. 100% of all the proceeds are being donated to the Lung Cancer Foundation. The last 2 weeks the grade 5 students have been learning all about feature articles, Tsunamis, Earthquakes and Volcanic eruptions. Viraaj and Jaymar from 5B have already written some great examples of feature articles about Tsunamis and Earthquakes. Please see below:

Tsunami

By Viraaj Aulakh 23/07/2019

-Occurred on 9th July, 1958 at 22:15:58 at Lituya Bay, Alaska. -Waves were as high as 1,720 feet (525 metres)! It was higher than the Empire State Building! -There was a landslide which caused a 7.8 magnitude earthquake that triggered the tsunami. -"I looked up there and there was something like an atomic explosion", a witness told BBC. -"We were swept up above the land and over the trees and that's where I assumed we were going to end up", a victim said.

2011 Great East Japan Earthquake By **Jaymar Haider** 23/7/19

Tōhoku, Japan has experienced an unexpected shake with a magnitude of 9.0-9.1 at 2:46pm. This shake was known as the fourth largest earthquake since 1935 and Japan's largest earthquake recorded.

The epicentre was 130km of Sendai, Honshu. The earthquake lasted 6 minutes which triggered a tsunami killing at least 20,000 people. In 2017 50,000 people were still living in temporary homes.

The depth of the earthquake was 32km and 125,000 buildings were damaged worth \$310 billion. This quake was recognised as the world's most costliest earthquake.

"I never experienced such a strong earthquake in my life", said Takahaki Takahashi.

According to residents of Japan, effects were felt in different countries all over the world especially next to Japan.

Saver Plus

Back to school can be an expensive time for many families. The Smith Family and ANZ run a program called Saver Plus, a program that teaches people good savings and money management tools. Eligible families save \$50 / month over ten months and attend a short money management workshop in the local area. At the end of the program, ANZ provides \$500 funding for school and extracurricular expenses. The program has been running for 16 years and has many fantastic outcomes, including helping and encouraging parents to talk to their children about money from a young age – as early as preschool and primary school, right through the high school years. When parents' role model good money behaviours and have open conversations about the household budget, this helps children be better equipped to manage their money as they grow, and can help establish good money habits for life.

To be eligible, you must have children at school or studying yourself, have regular income (either your or your partner) have a current Health Care card or concession card and be receiving Centrelink benefits. Our local co-ordinator is Tina McElligott 0439 585 702.

Huge demand for bilingual law graduates

University applications - VTAC

Year 12 students - have you started your VTAC application yet?

If you are planning to study at a Victorian university or TAFE within the next two years, you may have to apply through the Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre (VTAC).

You don't have to know what courses you would like to apply for this stage, but you will need to start your application by the 30th of September to avoid a late fee.

The following are steps to follow to get started on your application.

Step 1: Create a VTAC Account

- Go to www.vtac.edu.au/
- 2. Click on "Sign Up"
- Work through the steps. You will need your VCAA/NESA ID number and you can make up your own 4-digit pin.

Step 2: Apply for at least 1 course

- Go to www.vtac.edu.au/
- 2. Click on Login and enter your VTAC ID and Pin (this has been emailed to you).
- 3. Select the course application link
- 4. Work through the steps

Step 3: Pay processing fee

- Login to your VTAC Account
- 2. Select the payment link
- Pay the one-off \$39 processing fee by Monday 9 December.

Step 4: Special Entry Access Scheme (SEAS)

- Work out your eligibility for any of the four categories by exploring the VTAC SEAS sitehttps://bit.ly/1PG8zl4
- 2. Login to your VTAC Account
- 3. Click on the SEAS link and apply for any of the 4 categories that you are eligible for.
- Organise supporting statements and any other required documentation and post them with the SEAS document cover letter to VTAC by 11 October or upload directly to the website.

Step 5: Access and Equity Scholarships

- 2. Login to your VTAC Account
- Click on the scholarships link and work through the steps.
- Organise supporting statements and any other required documentation and post them with the Scholarship document cover letter to VTAC by 11 October or upload directly to the website.


According to their New Work Smarts report, you can expect the following to occur by 2030:

- Automation and globalization will change what we do in every job.
- Within the next 10 years, many jobs will no longer exist
- Workers will spend 100% more time solving problems, 30% more time learning and 77% more time using STEM skills (science, technology, maths, engineering) than the same jobs demand now.
- Workers will spend more time getting value out of technology and use more digital skills (e.g., updating websites)

- Workers will spend less time on routine and manual tasks due to automation, and more time focused on people, solving strategic problems and thinking creatively.


