Career News

Subject Selection is coming up fast...

Have you picked your subjects yet? Or perhaps you've got no idea what to choose?

There are two key things to note right at the start:

Your choices can affect your options for Year 12 and beyond.
If you stuff it up don't worry – there's usually a way around it.

Choosing your senior subjects can be a big deal, so we've put together some thoughts to help you navigate the process.

Subject selection is important for a couple of reasons:

The subjects you pick may affect your ATAR

If you want to go to uni you may need to have taken certain courses at school (called prerequisites) to get into specific courses. For example, for engineering you generally need to study a higher level of maths and some sciences.

Technically, your subject choices could be the start of your career pathway. And for some people that's what happens...

BUT (and it's a really big but) if you don't pick the 'right' subjects at this stage then it doesn't mean your career is permanently derailed. If you don't take a subject now and realise when you apply for uni that it was essential then there are bridging courses you can take to get you up to speed quickly.

For a great example and explanation of bridging courses, check out the [QTAC website](#).

Remember: Very very few people have a clear idea of what they want to do when they 'grow up' at 15 years old.

And as for how your subject choices affect your ATAR – all the guidance from the experts says that you should never choose subjects to try and maximise your ATAR. For example, [VTAC](#) say:

"Selecting your VCE program based on studies that are scaled up will not guarantee you a high ATAR."

What does this mean? It means that you should pick what you want and not worry too much about whether or not you may need something for uni or to get a good ATAR.

Ok... so how should I choose my subjects?

The rules differ between each state, so check with your school to find out how many subjects you need to select to qualify for an ATAR/OP. Generally, you'll need to pick around 6 subjects to qualify.

You should choose subjects that:

You enjoy

You are good at

You find interesting

Give you choice down the track

There is lots of evidence to support that you will do better if you choose subjects you enjoy and are interested in.

What about maths?

I know you've heard this a hundred thousand times, but you'll use maths in an amazing number of ways throughout your life. So if you absolutely hate it and definitely don't want to study anything science, medical, engineering or maths related then don't take it. Otherwise, selecting at least the base level maths course is a good plan.

If there's a chance you'll want to study any kind of science, IT, business studies, PE, or even art then select maths.

What else?

There's an easy way to narrow down your list:

Print out a list of all the subjects you can choose from

Circle the English and maths subjects you've chosen

If you know what you'd like to study at uni, then circle the ones you have to do as prerequisites. You can get a list of prerequisites from the uni's website (we've put them together for you below)

Cross out any subjects you hate – if you hate it now there's no way you'll do well in it

With a highlighter, select the subjects you love, as well as your best subjects

Out of what's left, underline any subjects that may be useful in the industry you think you want to enter

If you've selected too many then skip step 6.

By this point, you should only have a few left to select (if any) so go with your gut

Don't choose for the wrong reasons

This decision will have an impact on your future. There are some things you should definitely not consider when trying to select your subjects:

Your friend is/isn't picking it

You like/dislike the teacher

It's too easy/hard

You'll have to do an excursion or project for it

These are real world decisions that should be made with an adult mindset. If you're having a hard time deciding then ask an adult you trust to go through your choices with you. I'm certain that any adult you approached would be honoured to help you.

NATIONAL DISABILITY INSURANCE SCHEME

INFORMATION FOR FAMILIES OF STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES

WESTERN MELBOURNE AREA

The National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) is a new, national approach providing individualised support and services for people with disability. The NDIS is administered by the National Disability Insurance Agency (NDIA).

The NDIS commenced operation in some parts of the State on 1 July 2016 and will rollout progressively across the remainder of the State, Area by Area, until it is fully operational on 1 July 2019. Key information for Western Melbourne is as follows:

Area start date	Local government areas	Local Area Coordinator
1 October 2018	Hobsons Bay, Maribyrnong, Melbourne, Moonee Valley, Wyndham	Brotherhood of St Laurence

Participants will transition to the NDIS based on where they live, not where they attend school.

Eligibility is focused on lifelong, functional impairment. NDIS eligibility information is available on the [NDIS Access Checklist](#) which is on the NDIS website.

There are two possible pathways for students with a disability to access the NDIS:

1. Students who are receiving specified disability programs or supports will have their details automatically provided to the NDIA. Your school will be able to advise you if your child is receiving one of these supports. These students may be contacted by the NDIA up to six months prior to their Area's start date and invited to test their eligibility for the scheme.
2. Students who do not receive any of the specified programs or supports can directly contact either the NDIA or the NDIA Local Area Coordinator to test their eligibility. This can commence up to six months prior to their Area's rollout date.

National Disability Insurance Agency (NDIA) and the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS).

The NDIA is an independent statutory agency. Their role is to implement the NDIS.

Information for families and students who live in Western Melbourne Area

Students who are in one or more of the following categories have had their contact details provided to the National Disability Insurance Agency (NDIA) to facilitate a smooth transition into the NDIS:

1. Students receiving Program for Students with Disabilities (PSD) funding for Vision Impairment;
2. Students enrolled at a Specialist School exclusively for students with Moderate to Profound Intellectual Disability;
3. Students with disability transport program (Specialist School Bus, taxi or conveyance allowance);
4. Personal care support at school (Program for Students with Disabilities (PSD) funding at level 4, 5 or 6; and/or Medical Intervention Support (MIS).

How do I know if my child is eligible for NDIS?

If your child meets the age, residency and disability requirements of the NDIS and you live in the Western Melbourne Area your child may be able to access the NDIS. Western Melbourne Area includes the following Local Government Areas;

- Hobsons Bay
- Maribyrnong
- Melbourne
- Moonee Valley
- Wyndham

When and how will parents be contacted?

The NDIA start date in the above LGAs is October 2018. The NDIA may contact you by phone or letter before October 1st 2018 to begin the process of access to the NDIS. Please be aware that the NDIA will call from an 'unknown' caller ID number and only leave a voice message if your voice mail identifies you by name. This is due to privacy concerns. If they are not able to contact you they will send you a letter. The NDIA is contacting a large number of families so you may not be immediately contacted. Your patience is appreciated.

What do I need to do after the NDIA contacts me?

As the NDIA may fund supports and services in addition to what your child is currently receiving at school, we encourage you to respond to the NDIA as soon as they get in touch. It is important to note the NDIS does not fund supports that relate to your child's learning. These will still be the responsibility of schools and the education system. If your child is eligible for the NDIS, you will be asked to work with the NDIA to develop a plan which will identify the services and support best suited to your child.

What will change and what won't?

Your child will be assessed for need and may be eligible for a range of supports. For now, your child's bus to school and support for personal care needs at school will continue to be delivered in the same way. If there are changes to arrangements in the future these will be gradual and we will talk to you first. For now there is no change.

What if my child isn't receiving personal care or transport?

If you live in Western Melbourne Area and your child is not currently receiving these services through the Victorian Government, and you believe they might be eligible for the NDIS, we encourage you to approach the NDIA to be assessed. You can contact the NDIA on 1800 800 110.

What if I don't live in the Western Melbourne Area?

The NDIS is transitioning across Victoria, Local Government Area by Local Government Area from 1 July 2016 to 30 June 2019. To see when the Local Government Area you live in is scheduled to transition, please refer to the website: <https://my-place.ndis.gov.au/ndisstorefront/about-us/our-sites/vic.1.html>. Closer to the Area rollout more information will become available.
