Dear Parents and Carers,

It's hard to believe that we're already into Week 5 of Term 1 2018 – and had several Outdoor Education camps already out (see the photos below).

The uptake of correct uniform at secondary continues to impress me and the students are looking very smart in the new active options and white shirts. Black pants and shorts have really made a difference in comfort and compliance.

In the last few weeks myself, Sam Watkins (*AP Secondary – Curriculum Assessment and Reporting*) and Scott Logan (*AP Secondary – Student Management and Wellbeing*), have been joining as many classes as we can to watch how students in our school learn and look at ways to support our teachers further. It's been great to see behavioral and attention improvements as phones and head phones are no longer used in classes.

Teachers have also been really effective in in sharing Learning Intentions (class goals) with students. A good way for parents and families to discuss school at home, is to ask students what their subject Learning Intentions were for the day. This also gives a basis for what should be studied each night.

As a school we will be using these classroom observations to drive how we use our Curriculum Days and focus the new Professional Practice Days - which were implemented by the Victorian Government for roll-out this year.

The Year 12 student common room in Argyle is now fully functional, complete with a new fridge and microwave (I must say the teachers staff room looks old in comparison). I also have to congratulate the work carried out by our VCAL team to construct the framing, plaster and paint the space. It is very professional work – completed by Year 11 students.

I'd like to thank all the staff and parents who attended the VCAL/VCE and Year 9/Learning for Life Parent Information Sessions. We had a fantastic turn-out and we know that students learn better when their families are involved in their education.

I'd also like to give a big shout out to the English Team for organizing the *Cosi* play to be shown to our students in school, bringing learning to life.

With the long weekend for Labour Day coming up, I hope that everyone has a safe and enjoyable mid-term break.

Award Winner



This program attracts over 7700 students from more than 500 participating schools. Anushka has been selected on the basis of our school's endorsement and her academic performance, community contribution and leadership skills.

She is now eligible to

- receive access to the University libraries
- participate in academic enrichment events
- meet like-minded students through on-campus activities
- gain access to the Young Scholars Portal

If Anushka enrolls at the University of Melbourne after year 12 she will receive the following benefits:

- a Commonwealth supported place into selected undergraduate programs upon meeting course prerequisites
- a \$2500 allowance to assist with education/resident costs
- a \$2500 Melbourne Global Scholarship for an international mobility program during her Melbourne undergraduate course

PRIMARY HOMEWORK:

Considering studying a Bachelor of Arts in the future? The Bachelor of Arts is an excellent choice of degree for students and one of the most popular choices in the country. The degree offers flexibility for students and majors/minors can cover areas such as science, economics, visual arts, IT, languages, humanities, media, communications, and design etc. The following are two excellent Bachelor of Arts programs to consider.

1) Bachelor of Arts (Professional), Swinburne University: This course offers 18 majors, 28 co-majors from other faculties and 42 minors. Students are guaranteed one-year of paid industry experience as part of the degree, extending the time it takes to complete the course by only one semester (total of 3.5 years). Applicants will need to achieve an ATAR of approximately 80 to be considered for admission, and this could rise for the 2019 intake, <http://bit.ly/1UTb3pZ>

2) Bachelor of Arts, Monash University: The Monash Arts Global Immersion Guarantee (GIG) is a groundbreaking new initiative – a guaranteed two-week overseas study experience for all first year Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Global Studies students, with the cost of airfares, accommodation and local travel covered as part of the program. This is the first initiative of its kind in Australia.

WHAT: Students will study the impact of the global movement of people and goods on environmental sustainability. They will:

- Work with partner organisations in areas like food and water security, conservation, urbanisation and eco-tourism
- Investigate the impact of regional economic sectors on the local environment, global supply chains and environmental sustainability
- Visit historical and cultural sites, as well as Monash-led programs in the destination country.

WHEN: The immersion experience runs between November and February as an intensive summer semester, and students will earn credit for two units towards their degree.

WHO: Open to all students who have successfully completed one semester of their Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Global Studies single or double degree and are in good academic standing.

WHERE: Either Prato (Italy), Monash Malaysia, or Indonesia.

WHY: Spending time in another culture challenges students to broaden their thinking, inspires them to approach problems more creatively, and opens their eyes to different perspectives. These are all skills that are vital for students entering a globally focused workforce.

Offered as an intensive, focused, and funded program, the GIG is an accessible way for students to experience international learning as part of their degree.

Student Connect, University of Melbourne: Every first year student will meet with a specialist Student Connect adviser who will

- assist the student to develop an action plan that incorporates goals that are tracked through the year, <http://bit.ly/2mjvl4e>
- **Federation University:** First year students can access a student mentor to support them in their first year of study. They can also join FedReady to assist them with the transition to university learning. Students can also join a study group through the PASS Program, <http://bit.ly/2IY8VF9>
- **Connect Volunteer, La Trobe University:** First year students can elect to join the Connect Volunteer program during orientation week. They will meet with a Connect Volunteer mentor, which is a later years student, several times over a period of 6 weeks in the first semester, <http://bit.ly/2ITsTRf>

Open Day at Collarts: Collarts is a private college located at three separate campuses across Melbourne and offering courses in Music Performance, Music Production, Fashion Marketing, Entertainment Management, Entertainment Journalism, Content Creation and Audio Production.
