National Assessment Program for Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) 2017

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is an annual assessment for students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. It has been a part of the school calendar since 2008. NAPLAN tests the sorts of skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life, such as reading, writing, spelling and numeracy. The assessments are undertaken nationwide, every year, in the second full week in May. This year they begin on **Tuesday 9th May 2017 and finish on Thursday 11th May 2017**.

- Language Conventions incorporates Spelling, Grammar and Punctuation.
- **Numeracy** incorporates Number, Geometry, Algebra, Measurement, Chance and Data, function and patterns.
- Reading incorporates comprehension.
- Writing incorporates writing for a purpose and audience.

It is extremely important that your child attends school on these days. Please try to ensure your child has had enough sleep, has eaten breakfast and has a nourishing lunch and snacks each day.

After completion of these tests, a NAPLAN report will be issued later in the year. This report is only one aspect of the Manor Lakes College assessment and reporting process and does not replace the more extensive and informed judgments made by your child's teacher.

The test results are used for many purposes some of which include:

- For parents to track their child's progress;
- For teachers to use results to help them identify students that require greater challenge or support;
- For schools to identify strengths and weaknesses in Literacy and Numeracy and to set future goals in these areas;
- For the Department of Education and Training to review programs and the support they offer to individual schools:
- To underpin the Victorian Curriculum.

Rationale

Consistent with the mission of Manor Lakes P-12 College, the homework program encourages students to take responsibility for their own learning. It encourages engagement with family and community, while recognising the many interests/activities that individuals and families pursue outside of school hours. Designed to be a positive experience for all involved, homework provides children with the opportunity to:

- develop a balanced lifestyle;
- develop regular study habits;
- take responsibility for their own learning;
- work independently in a self motivated way;
- make links to wider community activities.

Guidelines

Manor Lakes P-12 College implements homework in line with the DET Homework Guidelines and Expectations. Homework will include an array of different activities to support the learning taking place within the classroom. Manor Lakes P-12 College recognises that many of our students and families engage in after school activities, so homework set is designed primarily to encourage positive family interactions and to allow relaxed time for children to pursue their own learning.

Homework at Manor Lakes P-12 College takes into account the need for a flexible homework schedule that accommodates students' after school commitments and fosters the development of the students' planning and time management skills. It encourages students to interact with family members, as well as finding time for themselves and their interests. This dynamic homework approach is designed to assist in making home tasks more meaningful for students and their families.

Homework at Manor Lakes P-12 College encourages communication between teachers, parents/carers and students about student learning. Activities complement the learning happening within the classroom and support the development of skills and knowledge in all students. Homework is designed to be challenging yet achievable, and considers the diverse range of students' individual learning styles and abilities.

Differentiation of Homework

The positive effects of homework should be the same for all children. However, homework can be differentiated where possible, to suit individual needs. Teachers and parents are to work together to ensure that all children understand homework tasks before attempting them.

Implementation

Homework will be provided to students on a regular and consistent basis and will be expected to be returned completed and signed by the due date.

The nature of homework tasks may change from term to term, reflecting the curriculum and different emphasis in the teaching program. However, homework activities will be designed to provide students with opportunities to practice skills, review content and deepen understanding of concepts learned.

Students are expected to continue their Home Reading program throughout all levels of the College.

*Tasks which have not been completed in school within a reasonable time may require completion at home as an additional homework activity.

All homework will be corrected promptly and feedback will be provided to the student, as per DET Homework Guidelines.

The Role of the Parent

While most students should not need the help of parents when they complete homework, parents do have a role to play. They should:

- develop a positive and productive approach to homework;
- create a home environment that facilitates the student's homework;
- encourage and offer help when such help is clearly required;
- offer moral support and be positive;
- report any difficulties to the teacher;
- allow ample time to play and engage in all activities assigned as homework (including the more informal tasks);
- spare some time to engage in those tasks that require parent participation;
- reinforce the idea that learning the balance between work and play is a lifelong skill;
- sign the homework when it has been completed by the student (on the due date).

If a pattern of homework avoidance develops, the class teacher will work with the child and their parents to foster improved homework routines.

Procedures and expectations regarding homework will be communicated to parents at the Classroom Meet and Greet sessions at the beginning of the year.

Love Physics? There are many amazing occupations suited to students who love physics. The following are three examples:

- Radiation Oncology Medical Physicists: are highly specialised professionals "who create, implement
 and monitor the procedures which allow the best treatment using radiation, taking into account the
 protection and safety of patients and others involved in the treatment process. In their role, they are
 consulted by radiation oncologists and radiation therapists to provide advice as to the best use of

- **Geophysicists:** study the structure and composition of zones below the surface of the earth by taking measurements using seismic, gravity, magnetic and electrical data collection methods.
